MSE OR EDS IN EDUCATIONAL LEADERSHIP K-12 PRINCIPAL

ENGAGING MENTOR AND COHORT-INSPIRED COURSEWORK

Students have individual administrative mentors from their district who work with them over the course of their program. Those choosing a cohort program will work with the same colleagues and take the same classes each semester, creating shared learning experiences and broadening their educational network. These students will take two courses each semester.

LOCATIONS AND FORMATS:

Both the MSE and EdS programs support the degree requirements for initial K-12 principal certification in Missouri.

- Open enrollment is available at UCM's main campus in Warrensburg and the Missouri Innovation Campus (MIC) in Lee's Summit. Courses are available at these sites for students who do not wish to be in a structured cohort program. Students can mix traditional face-to-face, Zoom and online courses, as well as utilize a timeline conducive to their specific needs.
- The Collaborative Principals Preparation
 Program (CPPP) serves students from the Kansas
 City area school districts. Classes are offered at
 the MIC in Lee's Summit, and a new cohort begins
 each fall.
- UCM partners with the North Kansas City School District to offer courses at district locations, as well as online courses. Classes start every other fall.
- For students who live in rural settings or aren't able to come to campus for in-person classes, we also offer course options via Zoom with some online components.
